- Video your home, inside and out, feature expensive items and family heirlooms. Check insurance policy coverage.
- Assess your house (access to water, fire-resistant roofing and building materials?) and always be fire-ready.

Due to the current digging installation of Fiber Optics on Southwood Shores Road, Stevens County Road Engineer, Wayne Cornwall, determined that the digging had to settle before chip sealing. He pushed back the date of this happening to next June.

Meanwhile, Public Works will be preparing the road and installing several dry wells to capture water run off. Also, we are asking for a new guard rail on the east portion of the paved road by the steep hill, and also where the new dry wells will be placed.

As you probably know, many people in rural areas actively feed wildlife in Washington, and Deer Lake is no different. We were recently contacted about a case where a mother deer died from eating something her body can't digest- corn. She was nursing a fawn that was left orphaned and most likely didn't survive on its own.

Why feeding hurts more than helps wildlife

While it is understandable that people are concerned about and want to help wildlife, the worst thing they can do is feed wild animals. Many species—such as deer, elk, and moose, are biologically adapted to survive without food provided by humans and have done so without our help for thousands of years. Animals are adapted to survive all seasons, including hot summers and hard winters, on limited natural food sources.

WDFW receives reports of people putting out hay, corn, or apples on a regular basis. Many don't know that it takes several weeks for an animal's digestive system to adjust to these foods. Without enough fat reserves to get through the adjustment period, deer can die even with bellies full of feed they can't digest. This is known as rumen



acidosis and there was a recent case of it at Deer Lake that killed a doe that was being fed regularly by someone putting out corn. Unfortunately, that doe had a young fawn that was nursing that most likely didn't survive without its mother.

Wildlife feeding causes many other problems as well. It can draw animals into areas near roads, often leading to collisions with vehicles, and makes it easier for disease to spread among animals grouped together to feed. Wildlife feeding also makes animals vulnerable to predators. Feeding deer, turkeys and other wildlife attracts cougars, bobcats, coyotes, and occasionally bears. Rodents like mice also try to take advantage of the free meals and can cause infestation issues.

Habituation is another negative result of wildlife feeding. It can make animals too comfortable around humans and they sometimes become aggressive when not fed fast enough. This often ends in the animal being euthanized. So how *can* you help wildlife? The best thing to do is to give them lots of space, especially in summer months when it is hot and animals are trying to stay cool. Don't approach them or try to take photos with them, as that can end with both animals and humans getting hurt.


In case of emergencies, it's a fast way to find information. We also post reminders a couple days in advance, so you can attend Board meetings or any of the activities that we sponsor.

This past summer there was some concern about the green algae. The county health department sent a sample to be tested for toxins, and it came back negative.

Every year, from about the end of August into September, we get green algae. Some appears on the surface, but mostly it's suspended

in the water column. Zoo-plankton eat the algae. Small fish eat the zoo-plankton. During the cold winter months, the algae food source left from the summer bloom continues to feed the fish. There needs to be a presence of algae for there to be a biological food balance in the lake.

When I moved here 34 years ago, there was much more algae due to the excess phosphorus in the lake due to the cattle that grazed north of the Narrows. With the removal of the cattle, the nutrients that the algae need was reduced. Motor boating close to shore stirs the silt on the bottom, releasing stored phosphorus into the water column giving algae more food to consume. All the boat activity on the lake helps produce more algae. It's a cycle that happens every year.
